Cuyahoga SWCD now provides comprehensive programs for 83% of the communities in the County, reaching 96% of the population! Staff works in 49 communities and assists Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works.

Thanks to the first ever urban agriculture grant from the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) the *Blueprint to Urban Agriculture* was completed and can be accessed on the web at www.BlueprintToUrbanAgriculture.com. As part of this effort, ten urban agriculturists received on-site assistance regarding soils, planting and irrigation to help them be more productive through a grant from the National Association of Conservation Districts.

The Program Year ~By the Numbers

The current Strategic Plan established 7 Strategic Goals related to the mission of the Cuyahoga SWCD. Thirty-three (33) objectives were identified under the strategic goals and the 2017 board-approved Work Plan includes numerous projects and initiatives that the staff is responsible for implementing. Some of those projects and initiatives follow:

- Staff received multiple grants ~ \$506,202 with \$237,040 in match dollars for conservation projects, primarily related to stormwater pollution prevention and water quality
- Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan Reviews ~ 222; 43 ~ Recommendations of Approval
- Comprehensive field reviews and reports of active construction sites ~ 1592 to date for about 200 active sites per month
- Long Term Operations and Maintenance reviews and reporting of water quality and water quantity basins in the county ~ 649 sites in 18 communities (an 11% increase since last year. Reviews included Cuyahoga County Library and Cuyahoga County Department of Public Works sites; with follow up assistance to 100 sites (20% increase in 2017)
- Tool Box Talks- short programs that focus on local environmentally-oriented business
- Educational programs included Rain Barrel Workshops (19); Rain Garden Workshop (1);
 Composting Workshops (2), Green Cleaning Workshops (2); Earth Day Events; Career Days; Backyard Stewardship; Invasive Plant Pulls; School Programs, including Water Festivals and poster contest ~ 17; Community Organization presentations-Garden Clubs, Master Gardeners ~ 9
- Stream cleanups ~29
- Latino Earth Partnership for Schools~18 teachers over 5 days
- Urban Agriculture Programs (soil health) ~ 3
- National Wildlife Federation Backyard Habitat Steward Training~15
- Trees planted-200 with more to be planted soon!
- Topical blog posts by staff on the cuyahogaswcd.org website \sim 42
- Stream assessments for water quality, erosion and habitat in West Creek, Chagrin and Rocky River watersheds
- Staff presentations- 2 national webinars, 4 statewide conferences, 3 regional workshops

- Professional workshops/trainings for community service staff, homeowners associations

Changing Behavior through Public Involvement

- The **BlueprinttoUrbanAgriculture.com** goes live!
- Active *Stream Teams* in Rocky River's Abram Creek, Baldwin Creek and Plum Creek subwatersheds that are engaged in local watershed protection and restoration activities
- Stream monitoring efforts at 24 sites in the Rocky River Watershed; Five volunteers do stream monitoring monthly at five sites in the Euclid Creek watershed
- Stream clean ups, bioswale stewardship, storm drain stenciling, monarch way stations
- On-site assistance was provided to ten urban agriculturists
- Staff provided 84 hours of technical assistance to area landowners on topics related to erosion, soils, drainage and conservation. On-site assistance was provided to 35 of those landowners
