We've Come A Long Way in 70 years

At the end of its 70th year in operation, the Cuyahoga SWCD has never been better. From our committed board to our passionate staff of professionals, programs have evolved from the early days of primarily landowner assistance, to increased education through onsite assistance, speakers programs, events and opportunities for public engagement.

During the last thirty years, the Cuyahoga SWCD has had a seat at the table, providing technical assistance and support to initiatives like the Cuyahoga River Remedial Plan (water Action quality improvements), National Pollutant Discharge & Elimination System (NPDES), Life at the Water's Edge (stream stewardship), the municipal stormwater management programs (stormwater pollution prevention), urban agriculture, sustainability and tree planting.

Throughout the years, we could not have sustained our programs without the help of our fabulous partners - from local, state and federal governmental partners, colleges and universities, businesses, churches, schools, local civic associations, and the people of Cuyahoga County. Today we offer targeted programs to 52 communities in Cuyahoga County and we are seeking ways to work with every community.



This anniversary years efforts have been amazing: the Cuyahoga Healthy Urban Tree Canopy Program, Master Rain Gardeners Program, N.U.T.S. Watershed Champion Program, Program, additional communities, floating wetlands, hundred volunteer hours, a new SWCD video, stream restoration and reconnected flood plain projects, inspection of 3500 construction and post construction sites, myriad school programs, 50 blog posts, great media coverage, soil restoration projects, urban agriculture workshops, rain barrels, green yards and healthy workshops, pollution prevention pledges, tree plantings, stream cleanups and storm drain stenciling.

As our 70th year winds down, we are putting the finishing touches on a new Strategic Plan, which is being fostered through a county-wide survey and with brainstorming

by the board and staff. Our goal is to develop a plan that drives tough choices and accountability deeper into the organization to truly help Cuyahoga County shed its Rust Belt moniker and evolve into the Green Belt.

The Cuyahoga SWCD board and staff are extremely proud to celebrate more than 70 years of leading conservation in the most urbanized county of the state. We are dedicated to the future through advocating for and implementing programs and projects that benefit our soil and water resources, and the people of Cuyahoga County!

Master Rain Gardener

This summer Cuyahoga SWCD hosted its first Master Rain Gardener workshop. This in depth 5-session course is based on the successful program from Washtenaw County, Michigan.

The course aims to build a community of rain garden experts. Instructors taught students to design, dig and plant their own rain garden. Classmates worked together in class and online to solve problems with rain gardens in their own yards. (https://www.facebook.com/groups/neomasterraingardeners/)

We are very excited about the results so far:

- 29 participants completed the course
- 8 new rain gardens have been installed
- 6 existing rain gardens have been updated
- 3 public rain gardens have been adopted and/or rehabbed by 6 volunteers
- Several students complimented the enthusiasm and knowledge of the instructors.

The N.U.T.S. program aims to restore tree canopy in Cuyahoga County by involving students in the processes of collecting, germinating, and sprouting tree seeds and nuts, and then planting these trees in the community.

Almost all aspects of the program are customizable to meet classroom needs, and are available to schools in Cuyahoga County free of charge.

Additionally, many aspects of the program can be correlated to state education standards through the use of the Project Learning Tree curriculum.
